



Personal Care Items Needed by UAlbany's Purple Pantry

Presbyterian Women continues to collect personal care items for The Purple Pantry, the food pantry on the UAlbany campus. Personal care items are seldom donated to or available from the Regional Food Bank. When I went to school in Albany back in the 60s, ?? it was just changing over from Albany Teacher's College to SUNYA, and I was one of those students who could have benefited from a little helping hand such as we are trying to offer. ?

On Saturday, Oct 2, there will be an opportunity for the women of HUPC to come together to assemble bags of personal-care items and some snacks for students/staff at UAlbany who need an extra boost to successfully manage their daily lives. We will also hear about the pantry from Sally D'Alessandro, our liaison at UAlbany. In good Presbyterian fashion, there will be dessert. ?? ??

We would like to assemble 50 bags in total (more if we can), and they will be filled with non-gender specific items. Please donate whatever number of items you can from the following:

- 25 handled bags, brown, roughly 8"x10"x4" (we already have 25 of them)
- young people and not-so-young people to decorate those bags (call 518-356-1691 if you and/or kids you know would be interested in decorating them--date to be determined--bring stickers, sharpies, crayons, cut-up cards)
- 50 cards to write on; one will be enclosed in each bag with a note of encouragement from friends at HUPC
- tubes of toothpaste (5 or 10 of your favorite?)
- toothbrushes
- "cubes" of facial tissue (a cube fits perfectly in the bag!!!??)
- cotton swabs
- bars of soap (maybe something like Dove? or whatever you feel is non-gender specific)
- disposable razors--again non-gender specific (dollar stores seem to have 3-pks of fairly nice disposables)
- travel-size or small-size "baby" bath powder, or other non-gender specific-type powder
- small- and regular-size shampoos and conditioners (or a shampoo/conditioner if you can't find separate ones)
- contact solution
- snack bags of chips, pretzels, trail mix
- candy bars and/or theatre boxes of candy

They still need hygiene products--pantiliners, tampons--and deodorants, but those will be donated separately, not put into the bags. Do you have other ideas for what might go in the bags? If so, please let me know, and I'll check with Sally to see if that/those item/items would be helpful and let you know through the bulletin inserts.

Please place your donations in the collection box in front of the Christian Education Building, with a note saying they are for The Purple Pantry or in the basket at the top of the stairs in the Christian Education Building, or drop them off at my house.


About Our Special Guest...

WHAT PRESBYTERIANS BELIEVE | Carl Horton

The world needs peace

But what exactly is this peace we say we seek?

f you ask a Presbyterian to define "peace," you'll get lots of answers, and they're mostly all correct. Peace is tranquility and calm and quiet and respect and all those things that we ask of our children, at least for a few blessed moments every now and then. Peace is well-being, wholeness, health, safety, security, civility and all those things we expect from our communities. Peace is diplomatic treaties, international accords, global conventions, mutual aid, disaster relief and all those things that create understanding among nations. Peace finds its expression in many ways, takes on a variety of forms and is evident in both the most intimate and expansive parts of life. And as people of faith, we believe peace — in all its expressions and forms — is a gift from God.

Peace is a dominant biblical theme, mentioned 400 times in the King James Version and 250 times in the New Revised Standard Version. In the Hebrew Scriptures, peace appears as the word *shalom*. In the New Testament Greek, the word for peace is *eirene*. Both words suggest positive relationships with God, well-being among humanity and harmony with the created order. Over and over again, Scripture provides clear images and visions of peace, urging believers to not just receive peace as a divine gift, but to pursue it as a way of life. In so doing, we become "peacemakers," and are called "children of God."

Over the past century, Presbyterians have been bearers of peace, often in response to pain, brokenness, conflict, oppression and injustice. When faced with national and global events, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and its predecessor denominations have determined that the church has needed to do more. In the Depression era of the 1930s, the United Presbyterian Church formed the Department of Social Education and Action. Following World War II, in 1945, Presbyterians were instrumental in writing the charter for the United Nations and establishing a continuing Presbyterian presence there. The next year, in 1946, Presbyterians opened a denominational office in Washington, D.C., ensuring that the voice of the church would be heard in the public square. In 1975, in the aftermath of another war and with the new reality of nuclear weaponry, the church determined that it would "reassess the concept of peacemaking," leading in 1980 to the adoption of a report to the 192nd General Assembly titled "Peacemaking: The Believer's Calling." This would lead to the formation of a denomination-wide peacemaking program.

Over the subsequent 40 years, peace has been something that we've recognized as the work of the church at all levels. We've nurtured and equipped Presbyterians of all ages to engage in the practices of peacemaking, recognizing that our formation as peacemakers is an essential part of our lifelong faith formation. And yet, sometimes the peace we seek as Presbyterians is not easy. Sometimes it demands change, sacrifice and a disruption of the status quo. Peace can often be countercultural and might even call into question the church's own culture, systems and structures. It can speak truth to power and take on the principalities of the world. And while Jesus may have been able to say "peace" and the storms would subside, the prophet Jeremiah reminds us that many times people say, "'Peace, peace,' when there is no peace." Indeed, peace is not peace if it is achieved for some and not for all.

In recent months, the words "no justice, no peace" have been seen and heard in demonstrations across our country. From Portland to Kenosha, those words and their variation, "know justice, know peace," have shown up on yard signs and in storefront windows. Peacemakers and justice seekers are again utilizing one of the nonviolent tools in the peacemaker's toolbox: peaceful protest. The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in his sermon "When Peace Becomes Obnoxious" said that "Peace is not the absence of tension, but the presence of justice." He described a peace that accepts injustice as "an obnoxious peace" and said he wanted no part of it.

For Presbyterians, peace is more than an idea or a declaration. It is the work we do, and it requires both compassion and justice. As peacemakers, we are both compassion-bearers and justice-seekers, meeting the needs of the world around us and righting the wrongs that, still today, impede justice for all.






Into the Light: Finding Hope Through Prayers of Lament

Presbyterian Women will be starting a new Bible study, this September, *Into the Light: Finding Hope Through Prayers of Lament*. It speaks of lament as a proper theological response to the difficult situations of our world. One of the foundational points of the study is that, in scripture, lament usually leads to hope. After crying out to God, the one who laments remembers God. While that doesn't fix things in the moment—the injustice, the loss still exists. The lamenter is strengthened to face the world and to hope.



Hope implies movement: both God's inherent movement toward justice and our movement toward God. Recovering lament may be one of the church's most timely gifts to the world.

CROP Hunger Walk Regional Public Relations and Media Coordinator

Part-time, 10-month position (Sept. 2021-June 2022), renewable annually upon review, \$350/month. Local supervision by the Capital Area Council of Churches in conjunction with the Regional Community Engagement Specialist of Church World Service.

Responsibilities include:

Working with the Regional CROP Committee to coordinate community and business sponsorship, publicity, and materials for the 8 CROP Hunger Walks that take place in the greater Capital District, most of them on the first Sunday of May. (A few have moved to the Fall.) The Regional Committee usually meets 2 times a year, either via Zoom or at the office of the Capital Area Council of Churches in Albany. The PR coordinator prepares and distributes meeting announcements, agendas, minutes, and other pertinent information to the Regional Committee members.

Securing annual radio/TV/newspaper support and/or sponsorship for the walks.

Maintaining current corporate sponsors, initiating contact with potential new ones, and acknowledging sponsor contributions.

Initiating media news releases for the 2022 CROP Hunger Walks, including social media promotion of the walks.

Organizing on deadline ordering and/or printing of flyers, posters, T-shirts, and/or other incentives. This component includes getting logos from sponsors, assisting in creating artwork for brochures, posters, stationery, and T-shirts, obtaining numbers of materials needed by local walks, and arranging for pickup or distribution of materials to each local walk.

Representing the CROP Hunger Walk as needed to local service organizations, congregations, community groups, and the media.

Qualifications include: computer, communication, organizational, and interpersonal skills; familiarity with CROP Walks and hunger issues; ability to work from home computer; familiarity with using social media; desktop publishing/graphic design skills highly desirable. Must be able to work independently and monitor task timeline to assure tasks are completed when required. Hours are variable, with clusters of activity in Sept.-Nov., and mid-Jan. through early May.
