

Cover letter from Pastor Kyle:

"Come, you that are blessed..." ~Matthew 25:34b

Friends in Christ at Hamilton Union Presbyterian Church,

Over the past few months, you have probably noticed that my sermons and our worship have been focusing heavily on the Gospel of Matthew. This is part of a larger effort to focus our minds, bodies, and spirits on the call to become a Matthew 25 church and people.

But... what does that mean? The Matthew 25 vision grew out of the work of the 222nd General Assembly (2016) and the 223rd General Assembly (2018) of the PC (USA), and helps us center around the call of Matthew 25:31-46 to actively engage in the world around us, so our faith comes alive and we wake up to new possibilities. (If you don't remember that text, take a minute now to go read it - it's printed in this newsletter on the next page!)

Through the Matthew 25 initiative, we are called to act boldly and compassionately to serve people who are hungry, oppressed, imprisoned, or poor. By accepting the invitation, we can help our denomination, mid-councils, and congregation become a more relevant presence in the world.

To become a Matthew 25 church simply means that we are committed to pouring love, energy, and action into one or more of these three focuses: building congregational vitality, dismantling structural racism, and eradicating systemic poverty. These urgent tasks are a direct response to the good news of Jesus and a faithful expression of what it means to be Christ's disciples in this time and place.

To date, 880 congregations and groups, 68 presbyteries, and 9 synods have accepted the call and pledged themselves to this critical work.

In many ways, we are *already* a Matthew 25 church. Our Mission Team's focus on hunger this year has helped us consider our practical and prayerful response to the needs of our community and world.

Yet there is more work to be done.

I am very excited by the prospect of HUPC becoming a Matthew 25 church, and look forward to discussing and learning together with you as we move forward. Your session has targeted November 21st as a Matthew 25 celebration day in worship. That is the day we hope to formally pledge ourselves to vision.

But in the meantime, there will be plenty of opportunities to learn more, to discuss what this means, and strengthen our own church's vision of what it means to be the hands and feet of Christ in Guilderland and beyond.

One of those opportunities is a bible study that will be starting the first weekend of October (more information on this can be found on another page!).

As we seek to "serve the least of these" in our community and around the world, I pray that we will be emboldened, challenged, and inspired by this call, and I so look forward to partnering with you in this critical work.

Matthew 25:31-46

"When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. Then the king will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.' Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?' And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.' Then he will say to those at his left hand, 'You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me.' Then they also will answer, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?' Then he will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me.' And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."

Matthew 25 Bible Study

The Gospel and Inclusivity:

Saturday, October 2, 10am-12pm & Sunday, October 3, 11:15am-12:30pm Matthew 25 Bible Study:

Every Sunday after worship, 11:15-12:30, October

10 through November 14

As part of our church's commitment to studying and engaging with the Matthew 25 vision, Pastor Kyle will be leading two Bible Studies that are committed to prayer and reflection on the themes found in Matthew 25:31-46.

The first study on "The Gospel and Inclusivity," will focus on the fundamental connection between the vitality of our congregations and the work of dismantling racism. A congregation cannot be vital without confronting racism; for what is at stake - when racism directs our congregational and community life - is our faithfulness to the gospel. This will be a two-part study, beginning with a Saturday event, in-person at church, on October 2nd from 10am to 12pm, and look primarily at Paul's letter the Galatians. We will conclude this study following worship the next day.

The second study will look at the different aspects of Matthew 25, from the stories and parables found in Matthew, to Jesus' focus on "the least of these" in our focal text. Each session will take place following worship from October 10th through November 14 (six sessions).

While you don't need to attend every session (8 sessions is a lot to commit to!), to get the most out of these studies, attendance each Sunday is suggested to help you gain an understanding of the whole picture.

To register, please email Pastor Kyle or the church office, speak to Pastor Kyle after worship, or send up smoke signals indicating your intent! If you have any questions, don't hesitate to reach out!

If you would like to attend, but don't feel comfortable gathering in-person, please let Pastor Kyle know so we can set up a virtual option.

Walking in Support of Nurses House in October!

On October 30, 2021, I will be walking to support Nurses House, a nonprofit organization that started in 1924 through the effort of Emily Bourne to purchase a house where nurses could go as guests to rest, recuperate, or get away. There were no safety nets, no pensions, no Social Security for nurses. While the house is physically gone, the mission of Nurses House still lives on: " to provide short-term financial assistance to nurses in need as a result of illness, injury, or disability" (https://pages.nurseshouse.org/about-us).



The population of nurses served as guests span ages from young adults to the most senior of senior citizen. Many face short-term, long-term, or permanent disabilities. They need funds to cover housing, utilities, health insurance, medications, etc. Because of their illnesses and/or inability to work as nurses, eviction for many is a real possibility.

In the past, I have participated in these walks, but this is the first year for me to step outside my comfort zone and ask for sponsorship. If you choose to "walk" with me through your donations, you will be participating in Our Lord's admonition in Matthew 25: 35-37, 40:

For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me. ... 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.'

Personal Care Items Needed by UAlbany's Purple Pantry

Presbyterian Women continues to collect personal care items for The Purple Pantry, the food pantry on the UAlbany campus. Personal care items are seldom donated to or available from the Regional Food Bank. When I went to school in Albany back in the 60s, ?? it was just changing over from Albany Teacher's College to SUNYA, and I was one of those students who could have benefited from a little helping hand such as we are trying to offer. ?

On Saturday, Oct 2, there will be an opportunity for the women of HUPC to come together to assemble bags of personal-care items and some snacks for students/staff at UAlbany who need an extra boost to successfully manage their daily lives. We will also hear about the pantry from Sally D'Alessandro, our liaison at UAlbany. In good Presbyterian fashion, there will be dessert. ?? ??

We would like to assemble 50 bags in total (more if we can), and they will be filled with non-gender specific items. Please donate whatever number of items you can from the following:

- 25 handled bags, brown, roughly 8"x10"x4" (we already have 25 of them)
- young people and not-so-young people to decorate those bags (call 518-356-1691 if you and/or kids you know would be interested in decorating them--date to be determined--bring stickers, sharpies, crayons, cut-up cards)
- 50 cards to write on; one will be enclosed in each bag with a note of encouragement from friends at HUPC
- tubes of toothpaste (5 or 10 of your favorite?)
- toothbrushes
- "cubes" of facial tissue (a cube fits perfectly in the bag!!!??)
- cotton swabs
- bars of soap (maybe something like Dove? or whatever you feel is non-gender specific)
- disposable razors--again non-gender specific (dollar stores seem to have 3-pks of fairly nice disposables)
- travel-size or small-size "baby" bath powder, or other non-gender specific-type powder
- small- and regular-size shampoos and conditioners (or a shampoo/conditioner if you can't find separate ones)
- contact solution
- snack bags of chips, pretzels, trail mix
- candy bars and/or theatre boxes of candy

They still need hygiene products--pantiliners, tampons--and deodorants, but those will be donated separately, not put into the bags. Do you have other ideas for what might go in the bags? If so, please let me know, and I'll check with Sally to see if that/those item/items would be helpful and let you know through the bulletin inserts.

Please place your donations in the collection box in front of the Christian Education Building, with a note saying they are for The Purple Pantry or in the basket at the top of the stairs in the Christian Education Building, or drop them off at my house.

Grace and peace to you in the name of Jesus Christ, our Savior.

In early October you will be receiving in the mail the Stewardship letter and pledge of treasure, time, and talent form for next year, 2022. The theme this year's Stewardship campaign will focus on is Jesus' teaching as recorded in the Gospel of Matthew, Chapter 25, where Jesus teaches that we are to care for those who are hungry, thirsty, strangers, naked, sick, and in prison. Jesus then says that when we do this "to the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me."

Over the past four months, our congregation has been looking at the PC(USA) initiative on Matthew 25 which focuses on three specific areas: eradicating systemic poverty, dismantling structural racism, and building congregational vitality by challenging people to deepen their faith and actively engage with their community and the world.

We hope as a church to demonstrate our commitment to living out Jesus' teaching by pledging our resources of treasure, time, and talent to this effort. All that we have are gifts from God, and we are called by God to steward these resources for the good of others. Jesus cautions us not to lay up for ourselves treasures on earth, but rather to lay up treasures in Heaven, "for where your treasure is, there will your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:19-21).

Throughout the coming months you will be hearing more about the Matthew 25 initiative. We will have moments for stewardship during worship. Pastor Kyle will be leading a Bible Study on Matthew 25 on Sundays during October following worship (see the description in this newsletter!). The Mission and Social Witness team hopes to increase the Church's financial commitment to Mission over the next year in response to the Matthew 25 call, which you will hear more about this during moments for mission during worship.

Above all, please prayerfully consider how you might pledge of your treasure, your time, and your talent to Christ's work through our church. Consider the many gifts God has bestowed on you, and express your gratitude to God by your giving back to God for the important work of our church.

Mission Focus for October. HEIFER INTERNATIONAL

HUPC is focusing on Hunger during 2021. There has been a lot of information shared with the congregation about local groups that are a tremendous help: Regional food Bank. Guilderland Food Pantry, the back pack programs, etc.

During October the focus will be on international programs. Specifically HEIFER INTERNATIONAL . This is of particular importance at HUPC since we support work in Malawi and Haiti. Heifer International is working hard to address hunger and poverty in the USA and around the world. During worship in October we will learn how Heifer works. A huge variety of animals, plants, training opportunities are supported by Heifer. It can be overwhelming! Our Mission Moments will be centered on the background of Heifer, Chickens, Bees, an Empowering Women. There will be more information on how to donate funds to support Heifer projects during October and November.

Heifer International was formed in 1944. Since then it has been providing livestock, opportunities to empower women and promoting improved methods to conserve the soil and water. The heart of the program is "Passing on the Gift". When a family receives a gift from Heifer they must pass on one or more of the animals offspring along with training and skills to another family in need. The ripple effect is just amazing!




We will have up to 9 slots available, first come, first served. NO sandals or open toe shoes! We are working in a warehouse.

'Is your heart full of mamas love now?'


'Yeah...'


Lois Wilson, Chair of the African Mission Committee at Westminster Presbyterian Church, will speak on how the program developed.



Ongoing Mission Project - Tea for the Soul to Go Project



Appreciating your pastor

Many people have complex relationships with their pastors because faith, church and God involve a mix of emotions. We have particular ideas about church practices, congregational priorities, the minister's use of time, money, authority and more.

But most pastors are deeply devoted to Christ and believe that God has called them to serve in a certain place. They have the best of intentions and work hard to share the good news of the gospel. So in honor of **Pastor Appreciation Month** in October, consider the following:

God doesn't call the qualified; he qualifies the called. Your pastor may need time to learn and develop certain skills. (Everyone does!) Bless pastors with your patience.

We don't change the message; the message changes us. You probably won't like *all* your pastor's sermons or newsletter columns. But instead of complaining, ponder that something may rub you the wrong way because God is trying to change you. Keep an open mind and heart.

If a church wants a "better" pastor, it just needs to pray for the one it has. Pray often and caringly for your pastors, church leaders and their families. The role is challenging, so support them spiritually and ask God to reveal his love and grace to these special servants.




