



News From the Communications Ministry Team — Please read, especially if you schedule events and activities:

The Communications Team has been working on clarifying and streamlining how we communicate to the congregation and community about activities and events at Hamilton Union. This effort is in response to concerns expressed about members and friends not finding out about events in a timely manner, double-booking of meeting rooms because the Church Office wasn't in the communications loop about an event, and incomplete information provided about events when publicity assistance is requested.

This is a multi-pronged effort, starting with our Facebook page. Effective immediately, Liz Eagan and Kim Matthews, our Administrative Assistant, will be managing our Facebook page. Liz and Kim have successfully managed a PTA Facebook page, and are well-qualified for the task. They will post events and other information about the life of our church. Pastor Kyle will continue to post items with a spiritual focus. If you have something to add to our Events section on Facebook or information for another post, please contact Kim Matthews in the church office.

We are also working on a one-page form for everyone to use when scheduling an event or publicizing an activity. It will be short, one page, and will prompt you for the "who, what, where, when, why" — and who the contact person is — in a fill-in-the-blank format. You will be able to request what you need right on the form, whether it's a bulletin item, Facebook post, newsletter article, or something else. The form will then go to Kim in the Church Office, and she will forward to whoever needs the info (newsletter, Facebook, website etc.). This way, the Church Office is always in the loop and your information gets to the right person or people. Stay tuned for more detailed information on this effort as it proceeds.

Finally, Charlotte Hasselbarth has been leading an effort to review and update our website, with a particular focus on making it clearer and more attractive to those looking for a new church family. Research conducted by Elder George Hannett of the Membership Team shows that people looking for a new church look closely at the website, and often at Facebook. One way to think about it is the Facebook page is the new front door to the church, and the website is the inside of the church. More on this effort as the group reports out.

Presbyterian Church (USA)'s Battle Against Hunger What is a Hunger Action Congregation?

Our denomination, The Presbyterian Church, USA (PCUSA) has taken a stand against hunger and provides resources to congregations to combat hunger worldwide. It has created a process for a given congregation to become The Hunger Action Congregation. These are congregations that want to formally respond to the biblical call to help alleviate hunger and end its causes. PCUSA focuses on six areas:

- Hunger Alleviation: providing and/or sharing food in a dignified way with an eye to longterm structural solutions
- **Development Assistance**: addressing the root causes of hunger and poverty through equitable and sustainable development
- **Hunger Education**: learning about systemic causes of hunger, leading towards faithful action that is informed and guided by directly affected people and partner groups
- **Lifestyle Integrity**: adopting sustainable personal and corporate lifestyles to restore justice and protect all of God's creation
- Corporate and Public Policy Witness: advocating and campaigning for changes in policies and practices to end hunger and its causes, promote self-development, and care for creation
- Worship: incorporating prayer, education, and preaching about ending hunger and its causes into worship

Hamilton Union has taken steps to alleviate hunger by supporting of the Guilderland Food Pantry and the he Purple Pantry along with our 2 Cents a meal program. We donate food plus household and personal care items and provide financial support through our Mission and Social Witness budget and Presbyterian Women. Over the years many of our members have volunteered at the Guilderland Food Pantry. Current, Cindy Schultz is very active volunteer and is the Hamilton Union liaison to the Guilderland Food Pantry. Throughout 2021, The Mission and Social Witness Ministry Team presented several Minutes for Mission on the topic of hunger to educate our congregation.

Interesting facts from the 2020 Regional Food Bank Impact Report:

- * The Food Bank distributed 55,781,898 pounds of food in 23 counties, the equivalent of 46 million meals nearly 40% more than in 2019
- * More than 80% of distributed food is comprised of healthy staples like fruits and vegetables, grains, dairy, meat, and other protein.
- * The Food Bank opened an additional refrigerated warehouse in 2020 to manage the increased flow of fresh meat, dairy, and produce.
- 72,000 pounds of produce were harvested for member agencies from the Food Bank's Patroon Land Farm



My name is Sally D'Alessandro and I am an Assistant Dean of Students at the University at Albany, overseeing the Purple Pantry along with my colleagues, Luke Rumsey and Jon Mattingly. On behalf of my colleagues and the approximately 1500 hundred students we serve, I would like to thank this congregation for its generosity and caring for our most needy students.

On Saturday, October 2nd, I had the privilege of talking with the Presbyterian Women about the history of the Purple Pantry and how we serve students experiencing food insecurity. We spent 3 delightful hours in fellowship as bags of personal care products and toiletries were decorated and prepared for our pantry users, complete with personal notes of encouragement. These items are expensive for our pantry to purchase and are not covered by SNAP benefits for those students who are eligible, but they are essential for our users.

Thanks to the generosity of this congregation, I delivered truckload of personal care bags to the pantry with many items left over for future distribution.

In my role at the University, I work closely with students who are struggling to meet their basic needs. Every one of these students has a story and most of them are heartbreaking. The biggest task of the Protestant Campus Ministry board is to plan and implement the Fall Fundraising event each year; this year that event raised over \$13,000 to support the work on campus.

The board is made up of 15 members, both clergy and lay, from a wide range of denominations. The board also includes several "at-large" members open to Alumna and/or faculty and staff members.

Honoring our veterans

Veterans Day has its roots in what was called Armistice Day, when a peace agreement ended World War I on November 11, 1918. President Wilson proclaimed that Armistice Day was to be marked with solemn pride in heroism and with gratitude for victory as well as the "opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice." In 1954, the remembrance was renamed Veterans Day to honor all U.S. military personnel. It's a reminder to pray for and honor all who serve and sacrifice, to support and assist their families, and to pray that God will bring peace on earth.

The journey begins at Advent

When Advent begins on November 28 this year, so does a new church year for liturgical congregations. The church seasons, which correspond to key events in Jesus' life, begin with the four-week Advent period of preparation for our coming Savior at Christmas. After the 12-day season of Christmas is Epiphany, which begins January 6 and continues through Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. That period of preparation culminates in Holy Week, and then Easter marks the pinnacle of every church year. Forty days after the Resurrection we celebrate Ascension, and 10 days after that, the Pentecost season begins; it lasts until Advent, when the cycle begins again.

"Like a great waterwheel," writes Joan Chittister, "the liturgical year goes on relentlessly irrigating our souls, softening the ground of our hearts, nourishing the soil of our lives until the seed of the Word of God itself begins to grow in us, comes to fruit in us, ripens in us the spiritual journey of a lifetime."


