

Congregation in Christ,

Advent is swiftly approaching, and it is hard to believe that we will, once again, be lighting candles, singing familiar hymns, and hearing the story of the Incarnation. As we begin this new liturgical year, we will be focusing in on the theme of *Close to Home*, using resources designed by A Sanctified Art LLC.

A Sanctified Art LLC is a collective of artists in ministry who create resources for worshiping communities. The Sanctified Art team works collaboratively to bring scripture and theological themes to life through film, visual art, curriculum, coloring pages, liturgy, graphic designs, and more. Their mission is to empower churches with resources to inspire creativity in worship and beyond. Driven by the connective and prophetic power of art, they believe that art helps us connect our hearts with our hands, our faith with our lives, and our mess with our God.

When something hits close to home, it affects us deeply. During the Advent and Christmas season, we journey through scriptures and rituals that are tender, heavy with emotion, and vulnerable. We carry the memories and truths of this season close to our hearts. *Close to Home* acknowledges the "already but not yet" tension of our faith: Emmanuel is with us, and yet, God's promised day our everlasting home - is not fully realized. It names our deep longing for God to come close to us.

The Advent and Christmas scriptures are rich with home metaphors and imagery. John the Baptist prophesies about the One who is to come, but reminds us that we are still wandering far from God's promised day; his message hits close to home, especially for those experiencing inequity and

oppression. After receiving the angel's news, Mary retreats to Elizabeth's home, seeking refuge and safety. Christ is born in the midst of a journey home, in a crowded dwelling space amidst livestock and shepherds alike. The Magi travel far from home to pay homage to Christ, and, having been warned in a dream, they avoid Herod by traveling home another way. In these scriptures, home is both physical and metaphorical, something we seek and something we are called to build. Ultimately, God is our home and resting place. God draws near and makes a home on earth - sacred ground is all around us.

Close to Home also names the pain many of us will carry into this season. The holidays can poke at our grief. Many will be missing loved ones lost to sickness and tragedy. The traumas of the pandemic will still be with us. Many will have lost homes - due to natural disasters, economic hardship, and unjust policies. Many do not feel safe in their own homes due to poor living conditions or harmful family dynamics. Many feel alone and isolated at home.

This Advent, may we be comforted by the One who dwells intimately with us. May we expand safety and sanctuary for everyone wandering far from home. May we come home - wherever home is found - to live fully with joy, hope, and courage.



Visio Divina Tuesday, November 23, and Wednesdays, December 1, 8, 15, and 22 7:00 pm on Zoom

Visio Divina is Latin for "divine seeing." This is a method of meditation, reflection, and prayer through a process of intentional seeing. Visio Divina extends the 6th century Benedictine practice of Lectio Divina by the use of visual imagery. Traditionally, Visio Divina was accompanied by Benedictine iconography and illuminations, however, different faith traditions have adapted the process over time, utilizing both secular and non secular images.

While we will meet most Wednesdays in Advent, please note the *first* gathering will be on Tuesday, November 23, since the first Sunday of Advent in Thanksgiving weekend, and most of us will be busy preparing for family gatherings that Wednesday evening!

We will gather for an hour to consider an image that accompanies the coming Sunday's lectionary passage. This is an opportunity to dive a little deeper into the gospel lessons Pastor Kyle will be preaching on, as well as a chance to explore these texts in a new and creative way.

No need to sign up or RSVP! Come as you are, as often as you like! No preparation necessary!

THE PERFECT GIFT

One of the most powerful things that Christians claim is that God saw the great needs of the world and offered a perfect gift in response, a gift that brought God and humanity closer together. God's perfect gift, Jesus Christ — a gift who opens a door. Jesus is the *perfect* gift, not only opening a door but coming through it. In Jesus, God joined with humanity, and in his life, death and resurrection, so our story of God goes, Jesus is the door, now standing open. The giving continues because God is with us, still — and always.

Even though many of us haven't been able to be together in person, we have been together in spirit and in faith. We missed seeing faces we love — up close and personal, but the physical distance also revealed, for us, the importance of those things which bring us together, even when we are physically far apart.

We will have up to 9 slots available, first come, first served. NO sandals or open toe shoes! We are working in a warehouse.




A good opportunity to serve the community, and the work is not difficult. If you are interested, please contact Wayne Gannett to sign up at igannett@nycap.rr.com.

Now that the school year is well underway, did you know that.... the Food Bank works with 250 partner schools to make sure the 5,700+ students the Program serves can count on a bag full of kid-friendly foods each Friday throughout the 2021-2022 school year.

Last year, the Program distributed over 170,000 bags, containing over 2 million meals. The bags included cereal, oatmeal, macaroni and cheese, PB & J, soup, a loaf of bread, fresh apples, a gift card good for a dozen eggs and gallon of milk, and a sweet treat. An average BackPack contains 14 pounds of food to help feed each student and their family over the weekend.

We are retiring — possibly temporarily, probably permanently: time will tell — from the Tea for the Soul to Go program that we have shared with Albany Med personnel since March 2020.





Thank You in Advance from Presbyterian Women


Thank You to Those Who Participated in the October 26 th Food and Faith Program for our Campus Ministry Mission.

The example of Mary

"We must look to Mary's example to know how to deal with the glorious impossibilities of God," writes Calvin Miller in *The Christ of Christmas*. "Look how she turned the world upside down by making one simple statement."


Jesus surely could have come to earth without Mary's aid. But God seems to prefer partnering with people to accomplish miracles such as salvation and healing. So God chooses Mary to carry the Savior. Later, Jesus often declares people's own faith crucial to their healing. And today, God works justice through us, not apart from us.

God doesn't force us into collaboration. Yet, notes Miller, "God needs only a little of our agreement in order to work mighty wonders." Like Mary's humble assent: "I am the Lord's servant. ... May your word to me be fulfilled" (Luke 1:38, NIV). And like yours — for whatever partnership God invites you into. God will do the heavy lifting, for certain, but he hopes you'll say yes.

A song with a message?

According to folklore, the song "The 12 Days of Christ-mas" was written to help young believers learn about their faith. Although no evidence proves that claim, some say the popular carol contains these codes:

- The partridge in a pear tree is Jesus Christ.
- Two turtle doves are the Old and New Testaments.
- Three French hens stand for faith, hope and love.
- The four calling birds are the four gospels.
- The five golden rings are the Law: the first five books of the Old Testament.
- The six geese a-laying represent the six days of creation.
- Seven swans a-swimming represent the gifts of the Holy Spirit: prophecy, serving, teaching, exhortation, contribution, leadership and mercy.
- The eight maids a-milking are Jesus' eight Beatitudes.
- Nine ladies dancing are the fruits of the Holy Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.
- The 10 lords a-leaping are the Ten Commandments.
- The 11 pipers piping stand for the 11 faithful disciples.
- The 12 drummers drumming symbolize the 12 statements of belief in the Apostles' Creed.
