#### "Good morning, God!" ~Camp Counselor

Beloved,

The words at the top of this page were shouted out every morning. I was spending a week at Camp Fowler in the summer after my junior year of high school, and my cabin counselor had this habit of waking up every morning and yelling out, "Good morning, God!" At the time, I was *not* a fan!

He *shouted* it! He meant business! It was his way - not just of trying to rouse eight teenage boys from their beds - but of framing his day in a way that put God first.

I'll confess, I don't always greet God first and foremost each morning. Most days it is only about survival until the coffee has brewed and the kids are off to school. In fact, many days, God does not enter my mind until I have showered, dressed, and sat down in my study.

Truth be told, I lament that. Because I think I am missing out on a joy that can only be found in God's presence.

Our days become what we frame them. If we frame them by how full (or empty) our coffee mugs are, then the rest of the day is spent seeking after more of that delicious substance... (excuse me, I had to go refill my cup!). Similarly, if we frame our days in fear and sorrow, then what follows is only to be expected.

But if we frame our days in God - friends! What *JOY* there is to be found! When we start our day *with* God, then we remember that God is *with* us, and always has been.

Admittedly, there are times for sorrow, and even for fear - that is natural and a part of living as human beings. But our *framing* - where we start... well, that changes how we react to those times of grief and pain.

So I want to encourage you, in the coming days - try waking up like my old camp counselor. You don't have to shout a "Good morning!" to God. You could whisper it. You could think it. You could even just invite God to sit next to you on the couch quietly while you drink your coffee or tea. But invite God in. The joy to come is immeasurable!

<u>Short Stories by Jesus</u> June 14, 21, 28, and July 5, 12, & 19 Wednesday evenings, 7:00 - 8:00 pm, in person



Jesus was a skilled storyteller and perceptive teacher who used parables from everyday life to effectively convey his message and meaning. Life in first-century Palestine was very different from our world today, and many traditional interpretations of Jesus' stories ignore this disparity and have often allowed anti-Semitism and misogyny to color their perspectives.

In this wise, entertaining, and educational book, Amy-Jill Levine offers a fresh, timely reinterpretation of Jesus' narratives. In *Short Stories by Jesus*, she analyzes these "problems with parables," taking readers back in time to understand how their original Jewish audience understood them. Levine reveals the parables' connections to first-century economic and agricultural life, social customs and morality, Jewish scriptures and Roman culture. With this revitalized understand-ing, she interprets these moving stories for the contemporary reader, showing how the parables are not just about Jesus, but are also about us - and when read rightly, still challenge and provoke us two thousand years later.

This book will be covered in six sessions, beginning on Wednesday, June 14th, at 7:00 pm. We will meet in the lounge for this in-person study! # **Finding Freedom**

Juneteenth, America's newest federal holiday, marks the official end of slavery in the nation. President Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863. Applying only to the states in the Confederacy, it declared "that all persons held as slaves are, and henceforward shall be free." But news of freedom didn't reach Galveston, Texas, until June 19, 1865, when 2,000 Union troops arrived to enforce the decree. The U.S. Constitution's 13<sup>th</sup> Amendment, which bans slavery, was ratified a few months later.

Just as freedom and justice came in fits and starts to the Israelites, so it comes to our own country and around the world, where the pursuit for justice continues. —adapted from *The Wired Word*





Many of you may remember Jack Haefeli from his years as Lay Leader or his work with the Mission and Social Witness, but there are some aspects of Jack's life you may not be familiar with. Jack was born June 7, 1928, in Richmond Hills, Queens. His family moved to Baldwin, Long Island, where he graduated from Baldwin High School before going on to RPI to study civil engineering. While in Troy, Jack met

Bev, a member of Fifth Ave Presbyterian Church in Troy. They were married in 1952. They had three children and now Jack has 8 grandchildren and 7 great-grands!

Jack graduated from RPI in 1950. Fifteen days after his graduation, North Korea declared war on South Korea. Jack was drafted for two years and worked for the US Army in the office of the Chief of Engineers in DC. Because there was an assumption that Russia was behind the conflict and might be moving into Europe, troops were sent to both Korea and Europe and there was a rush to build airfields. Jack designed airfields in Turkey and Greenland. Along with his secretary in the DC office, who saw herself as his "mom away from home," Jack ran a home improvement business, doing home inspections and advising people about various home issues. During his 30-day leave, he worked with an RPI buddy's business, in Glens Falls, designing and handling sales. After discharge, he and Bev moved to Albany, where he continued to work for himself in the home improvement field; he manufactured pre-fab buildings, such as garages and camps, and segued into retail sales of those. He often worked for attorneys as an "expert witness" concerning construction issues.


Jack read the Bible cover-to-cover during basic training and ended up running a bible study at a Catholic church in DC. He'd been visiting vets for many years, and the chaplain at the VA convinced him to take courses and become a certified chaplain. After that, Jack worked with inmates at various area hospitals and worked with the Samaritans answering phones on a suicide hotline. For thirty years, Jack was a counselor at Coxsackie, "doing what I loved!" For about 20 years, Jack and Bev spent half of each year in Canada where Jack counseled teenagers in dysfunctional families and led a large Bible study.


At all the churches they were in, Jack served on Session and on many committees. Meanwhile, Jack and Bev had downsized from their house on South Manning Boulevard to the Serafini Apartments on Western Ave. Bev died in 2014 and by 2016, Jack was interest in joining HUPC. He did so, after Bev, "in a dream" said that it was "Ok."

Because of health issues, his kids convinced him to move to assisted living. In June 2019, he gave up his car and moved into Atria Crossgates and became "Kind of a chaplain" there. He led a discussion group about current issues and participated in Bible study.

News on hunger, from CBS News March 21, 2023:

Almost 25% of American adults are food insecure, a jump of about five percentage points from a year earlier as the double whammy of high inflation and the end of <u>pandemic benefits</u> squeezes more household budgets, according to a new study by the Urban Institute.

Food insecurity <u>indicates</u> that someone isn't able to secure enough food for a nutritious diet, which can lead to skipping meals or cutting back on food. Those strategies, though, can have implications for a person's health and well-being, experts say.

The rise in food insecurity comes as more households are <u>struggling to pay</u> their typical bills amid grocery costs that have surged 20% in two years and rents that have increased 13%. Inflation surged last year to a four-decade high just as several pandemic-related benefits came to an end, heightening the financial stress for many, according to the new report from the Urban Institute.

"Food insecurity can be a canary in the coal mine for people who are experiencing high levels of hardship and aren't able to meet their household needs," Kassandra Martinchek, a research associate in the Center on Labor, Human Services, and Population at the Urban Institute, told CBS MoneyWatch.

She added, "It's a household economic condition where folks don't have enough resources to have enough food for their family for an active or healthy life."



#### Ever Outward! A Reminder from the Communications Ministry Team

As you plan events, the Communications Ministry Team would like to remind everyone to consider our greater community, the one outside our church parking lot. Is the event you are planning something people outside of our immediate church community might be interested in?

This is a slightly different mindset than we have had in the past, where we tended to focus on our immediate church family for communications about events. For example, traditionally, we might list an event in the Bulletin, the Monday Digest, and the Calendar and write an article about it for the Good News. However, these are all internal communications outlets — they often don't extend into our greater community.

Reaching our greater community is different now than in years past, when one could put up some flyers around town, send out a news release to the local newspapers, put up a sign on the church lawn and call it good. Signs and flyers still work, but instead of one news release we have a plethora of online community bulletin boards, as well as social media. Each one has a different format and deadline.

Reaching out to our greater community is a major reason we are asking folks to please use the events planning form (paper copy in this newsletter) or include all the information it covers in an email to Kim. Kim will then take your information and put it on bulletin boards, social media, etc. Of particular note on the form is where you would like your event publicized — this is where you can tell Kim it's for the community. **Important: Kim needs your form or information at least three weeks before your event in order to meet publication deadlines for local newspapers and give social media time to do its thing.** Also, it's important to let people — those in our church community and those in the community — know about an event in enough time for them to make plans to attend.

#### **Getting to know your Session Teams**

We are starting a series in the monthly newsletters to highlight the work of the seven Session Teams: Worship and Congregational Life, Mission, Communications and Outreach, Finance, Personnel, Membership and Engagement, and Property. Each Session member leads a different Team focusing on the activities and responsibilities of the church. Each Team includes - and welcomes -other people from the church family to help plan and carry out the Teams' responsibilities.



#### Focus on the Property Team

The Property committee is led by new Session Member Chandra Reis. Current members include Rae Rau, Steve Smith, Hugh Stevens, Bruce Williamson, and Jim Gade. Property, as the name suggests, manages and maintains the physical structures and the land that belongs to Hamilton Union Presbyterian Church.

Property is a unique blend of standard services, do-ityourself, and outsourcing. Certain responsibilities are required by regulation to be outsourced, like boiler inspec-

tions, mold remediation or the planned redesign of the handicap access ramp and sanctuary entrance. Others just make more sense to outsource like the lawn care and snowplowing. Standard services include maintaining the electrical and heating systems. We also interface with the Nursery School to make sure that the space they use is safe, functional, and compliant with all the necessary codes.

Do-it-yourself tasks are where the creative sides of our members can shine. We have projects ranging from little (replace the mailbox or hang billboards) to big (get a scissors lift and repaint the cross out front or get rid of wasp nests and moles). This also includes the maintenance of the flower gardens and the playground area out back.

No skills or experience are necessary to join Property committee. It's a great opportunity to learn how to do maintenance tasks (replacing light bulbs or replacing thermostats or patching wallboard), or just help with one project (like planting or tending a garden) while working with people who have done this before. If you are interested, please reach out to Chandra or anyone on the Committee. The fun part about a 200 year old property is that new opportunities pop up all the time!

### Backpack to School Event Saturday, August 26, 11 am - 2 pm

Every August, families receive letters from school. These letters are exciting! Who will the new teacher be? When is the first day? What will I need?

For some, these letters bring smiles and anticipation (if not a little sadness that summer will be coming to an end). For many, however, these letters bring a twinge of anxiety, particularly around the "school supply" lists. Backpacks, notebooks, pencils, erasers... parents start doing the math, adding up how much all of this will cost.

In the last year, with rising inflation and consumer costs, these anxieties are only growing more severe. One parent shared with me that, between their three school-aged children, last year they spent over two hundred dollars on school supplies alone - not to mention back-to-school clothes, shoes, and haircuts!

Like last year, our congregation will be stepping up to meet the needs presented by these challenges, to give some help and ease the burden on families in our school district.

We still have quite a bit of supplies to donate that were left over from last year. <u>However, our greatest need right now is backpacks!</u> At this time, we <u>do not need</u> no. 2 pencils, rulers, composition notebooks, 2 pocket folders, child-safe scissors, or erasers.

On Saturday, August 26, we will have a "Backpack to School" event, where families in our community will be invited to come and get a backpack stuffed with school supplies for the coming academic year.

Additionally, we will have a cookout to celebrate with these families and our community, activities for all ages, and some time for fellowship with our neighbors in Guilderland and beyond.

All donations for this endeavor are welcome now through August 24th. Please bring backpacks to Kim in the office.


