As this long, warm month draws to a close, I'm both grateful for the rejuvenating summer and eager for fall's new energy.

Beloved,

A few years ago, Elena and I discovered the competition baking show, *The Great British Baking Show*. As the name implies, it is a baking competition from England, where twelve amateur bakers compete over the course of 10 weeks to become the "Star Baker." I confess that I was skeptical at first. I'm not a big fan of "reality tv," but this show is so engaging! The judges are critical, but kind; the contestants do not attempt to undercut one another, but instead encourage and applaud each other's successes, and console in failures.

Each week has a different theme, but my favorite each season is "Bread Week." Bread is something that humans have been eating since time can remember. It is classic; it is sustaining; it has been vital to our very survival at times.

But bread is also demanding. It demands attention, to be kneaded and rolled; it demands patience, giving the yeast plenty of time to mature, the dough enough time to rise. Depending on the type of bread you make, the recipe will change. It takes a lot to make a *good* loaf of bread.

It is probably my favorite week of *The Great British Baking Show* because *communion* is one of my favorite things to lead and participate in. The whole of the sixth chapter of John's gospel is, from beginning to end, "the bread chapter." Jesus as the bread of life and the bread of heaven. He begins the chapter by literally feeding five thousand people (v. 1-14); the chapter ends with Jesus foreshadowing the Eucharistic meal, that *he* will be the bread and wine that they eat and drink.

All of which gets me thinking... what feeds *us*? When I watch *The Great British Baking Show*, I confess that my mouth waters at the sight of extraordinary, delicious looking cakes, pies, biscuits, and tarts. Yet at the same time, I know these only fill me *temporarily*. I will eventually be hungry again. But what is going to feed me in a way that sustains me, in a way that I will not be hungry again? Quite simply: the life and love of Jesus.

Yet that comes to us in many forms. I could give examples, but I want to know what feeds *you*. What nourishes your spirit? What feeds your soul? What fills you in ways that you don't need filling again? Is it a shared meal around a table in Fellowship Hall? Is it a bible or book

book study with friends? Is it getting involved packing boxes of food at the Regional Food Bank?

What feeds you?

This isn't just rhetorical - I really want to know! So over the next mont or so, come find me! Let's sit down and talk about just what it is that feeds you and fills you and builds you up for the sharing and living of these days. Because the life and love of Jesus that we encounter is a life and love that needs to be shared - just like a good, tasty bread.

Introducing: The Narrative Lectionary!

For as long as I have been preaching, I have stuck, by and large, to the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL). "I'm a lectionary preacher," I would say. The RCL was the product of a collaboration between the North American Consultation on Common Texts (CCT) and the International English Language Liturgical Consultation (ELLC), and was publicly released in 1994. It is a three-year cycle that guides churches around the world in suggested readings for a given Sunday, based in part on the date of the liturgical calendar.

One of the things I have loved about the RCL is that I know, wherever we are worshiping, there are other churches in the world reading these same texts. It helps to build up the idea of the Body of Christ.

At the same time, the RCL has felt a bit stale recently, and I have looked for a way to shake things up. Which brings us to the "Narrative Lectionary" (NL).

This is *four*-year cycle of readings for the Sundays from September through May each year, and follow the sweep of the biblical story, from Creation through the early Christian church. The texts show the breadth and variety of voices within Scripture. They invite us to hear the stories of Abraham and Sarah, Moses and the prophets, Jesus, and Paul. Listening to the many different voices within Scripture enriches preaching and the life of faith.

This summer, we have experienced what it can be like to follow the larger narrative of scripture as we have walked through Genesis, following the story of the family of Abraham (in all its realness!).

Though the RCL has united the church in its reading of scripture and has given much-needed structure, it doesn't present scripture - especially the Old Testament - in a way that helps people become fluent in the first language of faith. The NL is an attempt to take nine months to do just that! This experiment was initiated by Profs. Rolf Jacobson and Craig Koester of Luther Seminary, and began in 2010.

I am excited to explore scripture in our weekly worship in this new way with you, and look forward to being inspired with you by the story of our faith!

Getting to Know Our Sacred Text: The Bible 101

It is no secret that many church members feel inadequate about their knowledge of the Bible. The truth is, many pastors feel the same way!

Most Americans own a Bible, maybe even two or three. We hear the Bible quoted in religious, cultural, and political discussions.

Yet too few people really understand what is held in these ancient texts. In fact, there is a lot that we *think* is in the Bible that *isn't* - and vice versa.

Beginning Wednesday evening, October 18, we will embark on a seven week journey of discovery to orient our understanding and get a sense for the whole of the Bible, as well as the sections in the Bible that we wish to learn more about.

We will examine the basic contents of the Bible with the conviction that we first need some level of elementary comprehension of the Bible's stories, poetry, regulations, and teachings in order to imaginatively interpret them.

The overview of our time together will be as follows:

October 18 — The Pentateuch October 25 — The Historical Books November 1 — The Poetic Books November 8 — The Prophetic Books November 15 — The Gospels & the Acts of the Apostles November 29 — Pauline Epistles December 6 — General Epistles & Revelation





Celebrating Sabbath: Accepting God's Gift of Rest and Delight

Appropriate for Both Men and Women, Plus Good for Personal or Group Study

Presbyterian Women will be starting a new Bible study, this September, *Celebrating Sabbath: Accepting God's Gift of Rest and Delight.* This study will consider Sabbath using passages from Genesis, Exodus, Deuteronomy, Isaiah, Matthew, Luke, and Acts.

Some points made in the study are:

- as a time to surrender unhealthy striving and frantic busyness, and instead trust that God will provide
- as a reminder that life is precious and working too much is against God's plans for our precious lives
- as a day devoted to community and justice and not exclusively to self-care

Ultimately, Sabbath reminds us to honor God who honors us by giving us a day each week to reset our pace, our priorities, and our lives.

News on hunger, from CBS News March 21, 2023:

Almost 25% of American adults are food insecure, a jump of about five percentage points from a year earlier as the double whammy of high inflation and the end of <u>pandemic benefits</u> squeezes more household budgets, according to a new study by the Urban Institute.

Food insecurity <u>indicates</u> that someone isn't able to secure enough food for a nutritious diet, which can lead to skipping meals or cutting back on food. Those strategies, though, can have implications for a person's health and well-being, experts say.

The rise in food insecurity comes as more households are <u>struggling to pay</u> their typical bills amid grocery costs that have surged 20% in two years and rents that have increased 13%. Inflation surged last year to a four-decade high just as several pandemic-related benefits came to an end, heightening the financial stress for many, according to the new report from the Urban Institute.

"Food insecurity can be a canary in the coal mine for people who are experiencing high levels of hardship and aren't able to meet their household needs," Kassandra Martinchek, a research associate in the Center on Labor, Human Services, and Population at the Urban Institute, told CBS MoneyWatch.

She added, "It's a household economic condition where folks don't have enough resources to have enough food for their family for an active or healthy life."

Ever Outward! A Reminder from the Communications Ministry Team

As you plan events, the Communications Ministry Team would like to remind everyone to consider our greater community, the one outside our church parking lot. Is the event you are planning something people outside of our immediate church community might be interested in?

This is a slightly different mindset than we have had in the past, where we tended to focus on our immediate church family for communications about events. For example, traditionally, we might list an event in the Bulletin, the Monday Digest, and the Calendar and write an article about it for the Good News. However, these are all internal communications outlets — they often don't extend into our greater community.

Reaching our greater community is different now than in years past, when one could put up some flyers around town, send out a news release to the local newspapers, put up a sign on the church lawn and call it good. Signs and flyers still work, but instead of one news release we have a plethora of online community bulletin boards, as well as social media. Each one has a different format and deadline.

Reaching out to our greater community is a major reason we are asking folks to please use the events planning form (paper copy in this newsletter) or include all the information it covers in an email to Kim. Kim will then take your information and put it on bulletin boards, social media, etc. Of particular note on the form is where you would like your event publicized — this is where you can tell Kim it's for the community. **Important: Kim needs your form or information at least three weeks before your event in order to meet publication deadlines for local newspapers and give social media time to do its thing.** Also, it's important to let people — those in our church community and those in the community — know about an event in enough time for them to make plans to attend.
