#### Community of love,

One of my favorite books to turn to for daily devotions, which I have probably mentioned more than a few times, is *Common Prayer: A Liturgy for Ordinary Radicals*. Each day's reading offers up a reflection, a psalm, a prayer, and sometimes more. The entry for October 1 tells the brief story of Therese of Lisieux.

"Therese was born to a middle-class family in Lisieux, France. When she was fifteen, she got special permission to join her two older sisters at the Carmelite monastery in their hometown. When she died of tuberculosis nine years later at the age of twenty-four, she was little known outside her community. At the request of her spiritual director, however, Therese had written a memoir of her spiritual journey, title *The Story of a Soul*. It became a spiritual classic almost immediately for its powerfully clear articulation of one ordinary person's desire to give her whole life to Christ by following every moment in the 'Little Way' of love and service to one's neighbors. 'After my death,' Therese wrote, 'I will let fall a shower of roses. I will spend my heaven in doing good upon earth.'"

Sometimes we fall into the trap of thinking our faith needs us to perform big, gigantic acts to be genuine. We feel we have to "prove" ourselves as "real" disciples. But the truth is, it is the smallest moments that make the biggest differences. Jesus' most powerful moments were acts of quiet intimacy — kneeling on the side of the road with a blind beggar; in a shut up room with a girl brought back to life in the presence of her parents and three disciples. In fact, it is in Matthew 25 that Jesus teaches us that in the most ordinary acts of service — feeding, clothing, visiting — that we touch the divine and bring God's Kingdom to fruition.

There is no greater vocation than to spend our lives in small acts of service. In the end, they add up to one *great* act of love.

#### Getting to Know Our Sacred Text: The Bible 101

# Wednesday Evenings, 7:00 pm (in person but Zoom will be available)

#### October 18-December 6

It is no secret that many church members feel inadequate about their knowledge of the Bible. The truth is, many pastors feel the same way!

Most Americans own a Bible, maybe even two or three. We hear the Bible quoted in religious, cultural, and political discussions.

Yet too few people really understand what is held in these ancient texts. In fact, there is a lot that we *think* is in the Bible that *isn't* - and vice versa.

Beginning Wednesday evening, October 18, we will embark on a seven week journey of discovery to orient our understanding and get a sense for the whole of the Bible, as well as the sections in the Bible that we wish to learn more about.

We will examine the basic contents of the Bible with the conviction that we first need some level of elementary comprehension of the Bible's stories, poetry, regulations, and teachings in order to imaginatively interpret them.

The overview of our time together will be as follows:

October 18 — The Pentateuch October 25 — The Historical Books November 1 — The Poetic Books November 8 — The Prophetic Books November 15 — The Gospels & the Acts of the Apostles November 29 — Pauline Epistles December 6 — General Epistles & Revelation



# For the glory of God

In 1 Corinthians 10:23 Paul quotes a maxim apparently well known in Corinth at the time – "All things are permitted" – but then qualifies it: "not all things are beneficial [or] build up." What if we applied his words to our decisions? For example, should we enjoy a cigarette if we're old enough to do so legally but others present have struggled to quit? Technically, it would be "permitted" to have a smoke, but it might not "build up" or be "beneficial" for others nearby.

What if we know it's not *necessary* to say prayers *every* night, but we're teaching a child habits of the faith? Although skipping prayers a few nights a week is "permitted" because it won't make or break *our* faith, maintaining that routine — in shorter form if everyone is exhausted — may help "build up" the child spiritually.

What if we *all*, by God's help, made it a habit to "not seek [our] own advantage but that of the other" – to do all, as Paul writes, "for the glory of God" (vv. 24, 31)? From minor daily choices, to how we vote, to how we use our money and resources, to much more, it could make a huge difference! Surely, Paul believed so. – Heidi Hyland Mann

News on hunger, from CBS News March 21, 2023:

Almost 25% of American adults are food insecure, a jump of about five percentage points from a year earlier as the double whammy of high inflation and the end of <u>pandemic benefits</u> squeezes more household budgets, according to a new study by the Urban Institute.

Food insecurity <u>indicates</u> that someone isn't able to secure enough food for a nutritious diet, which can lead to skipping meals or cutting back on food. Those strategies, though, can have implications for a person's health and well-being, experts say.

The rise in food insecurity comes as more households are <u>struggling to pay</u> their typical bills amid grocery costs that have surged 20% in two years and rents that have increased 13%. Inflation surged last year to a four-decade high just as several pandemic-related benefits came to an end, heightening the financial stress for many, according to the new report from the Urban Institute.

"Food insecurity can be a canary in the coal mine for people who are experiencing high levels of hardship and aren't able to meet their household needs," Kassandra Martinchek, a research associate in the Center on Labor, Human Services, and Population at the Urban Institute, told CBS MoneyWatch.

She added, "It's a household economic condition where folks don't have enough resources to have enough food for their family for an active or healthy life."
