Dear Friends,

One of my favorite daily devotional books, *Common Prayer: A Liturgy for Ordinary Radicals*, which I have invoked many times, notes the occasion of All Saints' Day on November 1st every year. The brief introduction for the day's readings begins:

"Since its earliest centuries, the church has set aside a day to remember the great cloud of witnesses who have gone before us in the faith, stretching across the centuries and around the globe. However hard it might seem to follow the way of Jesus in our own time and place, this is a day to remember that we may be crazy, but we are not alone."

Indeed, this reminder each year is not just a time for us to pause and remember those who have died in the past year who have been close to us or members of our community, but a reminder of how deep and wide is the entire people of God.

In a time and a world that makes it easy to feel like we are alone, divided, cut off from one another for any number of reasons (political, cultural, etc.), this day reminds us that we are one in the body of Christ, and Christ cannot be divided. This good news is particularly striking as wars rage and natural disasters become more frequent. Our hope abides in God, three-in-one, whose love never ends, always calling us home.

I would like to close with this prayer from that same devotional which closes the entry for November 1.

Lord, your saints come from every nation and every tribe. Such is the beauty of your kingdom, where every race and people are honored and recognized as being made in your image. Help us live lives of peace and reconciliation that pay homage to the diversity of your great cloud of witnesses. Amen.

Christmas is coming! This isn't a call to start your shopping, but it is a note to encourage you to mark your calendars for our special services coming up in this season of preparation.



#### DO YOU REMEMBER WHEN YOU WERE SIX YEARS OLD?

**JOANNE WAGNER DOES! 84** years ago, when she was six years old, Joanne started attending Hamilton Union Presbyterian Church, with her neighbors. She went with them to Sunday school and church! At age 14, she joined the church as part of a large communicants' class led by The Reverend Edgar DeGraff, the pastor. The class included cousins Vera and Jack Ward, Randall Hallenbeck, Tom Constable, Joan, Maybelle and Bertha Beaton, Ed Vedder and others. This was a very active Youth Group. On Christmas Eve they caroled <u>by foot</u>. Their route included walking Willow and Hamilton Streets, Foundry Rd, and Rt. 20 to the area where "Hamilton Square" is now located. They returned to the church for snacks and hot chocolate and then attended the e late worship service.

Joanne Mesick (Wagner) was born on October 15, 1933, in Amsterdam, NY. Her parents had been residing in Guilderland since 1931, but <u>she has remained a town resident all 90 years</u>. Early on, the family lived on Willow Street in the house next to the two-room school house (currently the New York State Police Headquarters) where her sister, Anna Lee, was born on Joanne's eighth birthday. The family then moved to 41 Willow Street. While living there, Joanne walked to school with the Beaton girls who lived a few doors down the street. Joanne attended 7 grades in that school before being bussed to Altamont High for the remaining 5 years, graduating in 1951. During her senior year, her parents built their home on Schoolcraft Street, where Joanne resided until her marriage in 1956.

Joanne says, "The Reverend Albert Docktor was the pastor who married us 67 years ago at Hamilton Union Presbyterian Church. He said that it was one of the most beautiful ceremonies he had ever performed. My husband's name is Merlin but I didn't know that for a long time. I, and almost everyone, knew him as "Moe" (Surprise!) The marriage license said "Merlin". When we were first married we lived in a small mobile home on the land where our house stands now (on Dunnsville Road). We started building in the summer of 1958 and moved in during January of 1959. At that time there was a Men's Club and Women's Guild (not Presbyterian Women) at the church."

Merlin and Joanne's two precious children and three precious grandchildren are her greatest joys! After Joanne and Moe's children were grown, Joanne became the Financial Secretary for HUPC. She followed Jeff Webb and held that position during the Reverend Thomas Duncan's pastorate. Joanne served on the Outreach Committee for many years. She worked efficiently on that committee with Al Deitz, Joan Hoose Howe, Joy Harding, Ron Messersmith, Ruth Runyan and many others. She has also been a loyal and faithful active Deacon. In addition, the Worship Committee has been blessed with having Joanne on its committee. For many years, Joanne coordinated the "Flower Giving Chart". She kept a meticulous record of the dates when church families donated flowers to be used in worship and, if desired, given to those with special Joys or Concerns, after the service. She also has been an usher and prepared and served communion. Joanne continues to be a greeter. In addition, she has been active in Presbyterian Women. She has served on the Coordinating Team and did a fantastic job as Treasurer for many years. In addition, she has been actively involved in the Lord's Acre Auction, Grand Garage Sales and Brooks' BBQ fund raisers. Joanne is a practical person with sensible ideas and she is also a very willing worker as well as a fascinating and fun-loving person with a lot of faith. When Joanne is not volunteering with the church, you can find her happily digging in the dirt, planting and transplanting. Joanne, has always enjoyed cleaning her home and at 90, she still scrubs the floors on her hands and knees. In winter Joanne bakes, reads, does jigsaw puzzles and cooks. She creates delicious soups. Joanne says that Moe was willing to eat anything she put on the table. He never complained about a meal, (*Perhaps because Joanne is a marvelous cook*) but he especially enjoyed anything Italian. This is only one of the many reasons that Joanne and Moe, together, made a beautiful, meaningful and lasting married life. They have been and still are both dearly loved by their family (including their church family) and friends. Joanne and Merlin's (Moe's) 64<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary was celebrated on May 26, 2020!

The community, our church family, their friends and family miss Moe since he passed away on December 21, 2020. His granddaughter, Madalyn ("Maddie") said this about her grandfather: "If I were to think of my family members and myself as trees on this earth, then I would consider my grandfather as the sun. Like the sun does for all living things on earth, Papa was always looking to give us everything we needed to thrive, he brightened our lives with his love, and he never asked for anything in return - except for our love."

If you don't know Joanne, please take time to meet her. You'll be glad you did! Just look toward the back of the sanctuary for a lovely and very modest lady!!

News on hunger, from CBS News March 21, 2023:


Almost 25% of American adults are food insecure, a jump of about five percentage points from a year earlier as the double whammy of high inflation and the end of <u>pandemic benefits</u> squeezes more household budgets, according to a new study by the Urban Institute.

Food insecurity <u>indicates</u> that someone isn't able to secure enough food for a nutritious diet, which can lead to skipping meals or cutting back on food. Those strategies, though, can have implications for a person's health and well-being, experts say.

The rise in food insecurity comes as more households are <u>struggling to pay</u> their typical bills amid grocery costs that have surged 20% in two years and rents that have increased 13%. Inflation surged last year to a four-decade high just as several pandemic-related benefits came to an end, heightening the financial stress for many, according to the new report from the Urban Institute.

"Food insecurity can be a canary in the coal mine for people who are experiencing high levels of hardship and aren't able to meet their household needs," Kassandra Martinchek, a research associate in the Center on Labor, Human Services, and Population at the Urban Institute, told CBS MoneyWatch.

She added, "It's a household economic condition where folks don't have enough resources to have enough food for their family for an active or healthy life."
