EPIPHANY OF THE LORD



May all kings fall down before him, all nations serve him!

PSALM 72:11, ESV

"When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy." ~Matthew 2:10

People of Epiphany,

The word "epiphany" (from the Greek *epiphaneia* or *theophaneia*) means "appearance" or "manifestation" of God, and has roots in the word for sunrise or dawn. Even though we are now fully ensconced in winter, the days are actually getting longer — each morning the sun rises slightly earlier than the day before, and sets a little later.

This is such an important reminder, especially recognizing the incredible amount of suffering and terror in our world that threatens to overshadow us. Seemingly intractable wars rage in many corners of our fragile planet; climate change continues to threaten all forms of life; oppressed and vulnerable groups are scapegoated and susceptible to violence.

Yet, for we who claim the name Christian, Christmas marks the coming of God to us, and Epiphany celebrates the appearance of the Lord in the midst of humanity. The Christmas stories of the birth of Immanuel (God *with* us) declare the divine entry; Epiphany extols the revelation of God to the world in the person of Jesus of Nazareth.

In our celebrations of Christmas and Epiphany, we rejoice in the dawning and the arising of the Light... and we are called to show Christ in our daily living, to be witnesses to God's true light.

We are indeed called to "Go, Tell it on the Mountain!" To show and tell of Christ as God's gift of grace and salvation for all people. This is the work we are called to; this is the charge that comes to us in the gift of Christmas. We must *be* the light of Christ by *doing* the *work* of Christ.

As a new year begins, let us take seriously this Epiphany work, that the light will continue to gain ground, and God's love, peace, and justice will reign.



A Year of the Bible

On Wednesday, Dec. 13th, the *Bible 101 study* wrapped up our comprehensive look at the construction of our holy texts. The past few weeks have been helpful in our understanding of how these books were constructed, their overall themes, and many other historical facts.

When I was ordained, a friend encouraged me to, every day, read scripture — to ingest it, to chew on it, to make it the very core of who I am. There are some days that are more challenging than others, but when I engage with the Bible, I find myself grounded and sustained.

So our next step in our journey with the Bible is to read through the entire text in *one year, using the popular book, The Year of the Bible, by James E. Davison.*This comprehensive Bible-reading program for individuals and group study offers a sweeping introduction to biblical



themes and concepts, complete with a detailed reading schedule for every day of one year. Through this daily practice, we will come to a better understanding of Scripture and a greater sense of community within the church. Newcomers to Scripture and longtime Bible readers alike will find their faith enhanced and feel a sense of accomplishment from reading the Bible in its entirety.

I don't always make New Year's resolutions, but this is one I am ready to do! If you would like to join me in this journey, you can purchase the book at <u>pcusastore.com</u> (search for the book title). If you would like to do the reading and skip the book, see me, and I can print you out the reading schedule.

Then, approximately once a month, I will offer a gathering space over coffee for conversation and contemplation about the readings we have done individually, to hold one another accountable, and to share the richness that we are discovering.

Making the Most of Ordinary Time

In liturgical churches, more than half of the church-year calendar is labeled as Ordinary Time. Although that merely means the weeks are designated by ordinal numbers (*First* Sunday after the Epiphany, etc.), people may assume that "ordinary" means not special, or not a church holiday.

Ordinary gets a bad rap, but it represents the bulk of daily life. Not all days contain mountaintop experiences that warrant Facebook posts. Yet "simple, consistent, sometimes boring faithfulness" can lead to out-of-the-ordinary results, according to blogger Karl Vaters. "When you're following God's will for your life and you string a bunch of ordinary but necessary actions together, extraordinary things can happen," he writes at ChristianityToday.com.


Likewise, although Christians may strive to be radical, out-of-the-ordinary followers of Jesus, everyday discipleship leaves a powerful legacy. In *The Ordinary Christian Life*, pastor Michael Horton extols the value of "the regular preaching of Christ from all of the Scriptures, baptism, the Supper, the prayers of confession and praise, and all of the other aspects of ordinary Christian fellowship." He says the result of participating in "the ordinary life of the covenant community" is quite extraordinary: "steady maturation in Christ."

The best part of my job is watching as the children transform from hating books and reading to beaming with joy when they make their way through a book all on their own.

A first grader who started the program last fall, described himself as a "bad reader." By the end of the school year, he proudly stated that he could "read anything." He wrote a poem for our anthology that ended with the line, "I'm proud of me." His poem was selected to be published in *Skribblers Magazine* and he was invited to read it at the NYS Writers Institute | 6th Annual Albany Book Festival at SUNY Albany.



Many of the children in our program not only struggle with reading. They live with chaos – a family member in prison, foster care, homelessness, domestic violence.

Your contribution will directly impact the lives of elementary school children in the South End. Ninetysix percent of our students improve their reading skills. All of them become more confident learners.

Sprinkle and split

A sprinkle of pepper and a dab of soap illustrate a big concept from God's Word.



What you need:

- Shallow dish
- Water
- Black ground pepper
- Toothpick
- Dish soap
- Bible

What you do:


- With the dish on a table, fill it halfway with water. Don't jiggle the dish.
- 2. Sprinkle pepper on the water.
- 3. Dab the toothpick into a drop of soap. Then touch its tip to the center of the water and observe.
- 4. Read Psalm 103:8-12. How does this experiment illustrate God's forgiveness?
- 5. Explain the science behind this experiment: The soap disturbs the water's surface tension. The soap molecules don't want to interact with the water. This repels the water molecules from the soap, causing the floating pepper to also move to the sides.
