


A few years ago, I was at a meeting where a candidate for ordination was being examined in theology. The student, a second-career pastor, was well-suited for the ministry to which he was being called. His answers were fine, technically refined and on point. But... he had an answer for *everything* (or at least struggled to *find* an answer for every question). He was able to *explain* things... but a small voice in the back of my head (which I did share with him later) kept yelling, but what about the mystery!!!

Even more years ago, during my CPE residency in Philadelphia, I had the opportunity to sit with a group of CPE supervisors for an evaluation, a process which helps students get a feel for what it was like to go through the certification process as a chaplain. I felt good, was giving good answers for *everything*, explaining *everything* well... until I got one question that sort of stumped me... I finally said, "Honestly, I don't know." One of the supervisors threw her hands in the air and exclaimed, "Thank God!"

Both of these experiences were processes that were not so much about having the right answers, but about having the courage and wherewithal to lean into the *not* knowing, the *mystery* spaces in our world (as I have come to call them).

As we enter the summer season, things in work and church tend to slow down a bit for some of us. We tend to try to fill those spaces up with activities and outings (which, don't get me wrong, are enjoyable!). But I do wonder if we overschedule ourselves at the expense of leaving room for something else to happen, whether it be spontaneous dinners out with friends, spur-of-the-moment ice cream trips to Stewarts, or simply the chance to rock in a hammock with our child or grandchild at night to star gaze.

This summer, I want to encourage you to make time for mystery, for *un*scheduled things that bring delight. Allow yourself a chance to *not know the answers*. Be open to the Spirit's movement, and remember God's presence with you.

Evening Vespers

Wednesday evenings, July 17 & August 21, 7:00 pm "Seven times a day do I praise you." ~Psalm 119:164

Fixed-hour prayer is, along with the Eucharist, the oldest surviving form of Christian spirituality, but actually has its origins in the Judaism out of which Christianity came. Centuries before the birth of Jesus of Nazareth, the Hebrew psalmist wrote that "seven times a day do I praise you." Although scholars do not agree on the hours of early Judaism's set prayers (they were probably adjusted and readjusted many times), we do know that by the first century CE the ritual of daily prayer had assumed two characteristics that would travel down the millennia to us: the prayers had been set or fixed into something very close to their present day schedule, and they had begun to assume something very close to their present day intention.

On two occasions this summer, you are invited to step away from the sounds of the world into a space specifically set aside for quiet reflection and listening for the voice of God.

We will do this through the praying of the evening hours (or vespers), and through music provided by our own Nina Zanetti. This roughly half hour worship and meditation is for everyone: those who are looking to tap into a deeper spirituality and those who would like to try a new way of praying; those who have much experience, and those who have none; those who need a quiet space to remove themselves from the hectic nature of modern life, and those who are simply yearning for more connection.

All are indeed welcome. Come as you are. Let us praise the Lord together.




All are welcome, first come, first served. NO sandals or open toe shoes! We are working in a warehouse. A good opportunity to serve the community, and the work is not difficult. If you are interested, Plenty of spots available. Please contact Wayne Gannett to sign up at jgannett@nycap.rr.com. See you there.

So what about this big warehouse where we volunteer?

The Regional Food Bank of Northeastern New York owns and operates a 70,000 square-foot distribution center and office facility. The facility includes dry storage space, 17 loading/distribution docks, a 4,000 square-foot cooler and an 11,000 square-foot freezer. There are approximately 35 Food Bank employees operating the distribution center and driving the Food Bank vehicles.

- The distribution center receives 211,500 pounds of food a day
- The freezer is 321,000 cubic feet, which is equivalent to 53,000 household freezers
- The cooler is 120,000 cubic feet, which is equivalent to 10,000 household refrigerators
- Food Bank drivers travel approximately 421,000 miles a year (1,619 miles a day)
- The facility can store 3,086 dry pallets, 1,601 freezer pallets and 375 cooler pallets
- The Food Bank utilizes eight tractors, 14 trailers, 15 straight trucks, and five vans and serves 23 counties in Eastern New York.

Why do stars appear to twinkle? Try this experiment to find out!

What you need:

- Aluminum foil
- Large glass bowl



What you do:

- Crumple the foil into a ball.
 Carefully unfold it and lay it flat on the ground.
- 2. Fill the bowl with water and place it on the foil.
- Turn off the lights and make the room as dark as possible. Shine the flashlight about 1 foot from the water's undisturbed surface. Light will reflect onto the foil.
- 4. Then tap your finger on the water's surface. As the water moves, what happens to the light on the foil?
- 5. This flickering simulates scintillation, which happens when starlight enters Earth's atmosphere. As light passes through layers of gas and water, it refracts and appears to twinkle.








THE WONDER OF STARS
